After the joy of the Platinum Jubilee comes the sorrow of the death of our beloved Queen Elizabeth II. As she famously told us, grief is the cost of loving people.

As well as being our Sovereign, Queen Elizabeth was the Head of the Church of England and was a devout Christian who served our God as well as serving us, her people, all the days of her life. She certainly kept the promises she made in her famous 21st birthday speech and in her Coronation Oaths. I have no doubt that God greeted her by saying "Well done, good and faithful servant".

As a Brownie I learnt the little known verse of the National Anthem:

"Thy choicest gifts in store, on her be pleased to pour, long may she reign.

May she defend our laws, and ever give us cause to sing with heart and voice, God save the Queen."

As we sung that, as well as the better known first verse at our service at St Wyllow on the Sunday following her death which I led, I couldn't help but acknowledge that she did, indeed, "give us cause to sing with heart and voice, God save the Queen" and to thank God that she had done so. At that service as we sang the hymn (chosen in advance but very appropriate for the occasion) "O Jesus I have promised to serve Thee to the end", I was very aware that Queen Elizabeth II had certainly done that! Then, as we sung the last verse . . .

"O let me see thy foot-marks, and in them plant mine own;

My hope to follow duly is in thy strength alone:

O guide me, call me, draw me, uphold me to the end;

And then in heaven receive me, my Saviour and my friend"

I felt happy to know that Jesus, her "Saviour and Friend" (and I rejoice to say mine) had not only given her the strength to live her long life of service, but had indeed, then in Heaven received her

We who are so far from the action have been privileged to join in the national mourning thanks to radio and television broadcasts but it has also been good to join with others locally to mark both our Queen's passing and the accession of our new King, Charles III and to pray for them and all the Royal Family at this special and significant time.

A book of condolence has been placed in all the churches of the Benefice, together with an invitation for people to lay flowers in front of the altar rail. That this has been appreciated is obvious from what has been written in the various books and from the lovely flowers left in memory of our wonderful Queen.

May our beloved Queen Elizabeth II rest in peace and rise in glory.

Amen.

The Green Abbey — Ecological Agriculture Project at Sclerder Abbey

The Chemin Neuf Community at Sclerder Abbey are planning to start a new ecological agriculture project following 'permaculture' principles. We are calling the project 'The Green Abbey'. Our aim is to grow vegetables, salad crops and fruit in an efficient and ecologically sustainable way. The project will draw on historic monastic traditions as well as modern practice and research in ecological agriculture. As the project develops step by step we hope to provide experience and training for interested people and volunteers of all ages, with a particular emphasis on helping local young people.

To launch the project we will be holding an Open Day at Sclerder Abbey, Sclerder Lane, PL13 2JD, on Saturday, 8 October between 11am and 5pm. Visitors will be able to visit the Abbey and grounds. A simple lunch and refreshments will be provided. And we will have presentations on Caring for Creation, on our vision for the project at Sclerder Abbey, and also some practical tips for gardeners and enthusiasts.



News from Lansallos

The Prayer Book (or Western) Rebellion

For most services at the Church of St Ildierna we use the 1662 Book of Common Prayer (BCP) which is much loved by many for its beautiful use of the English language, thanks to Thomas Cranmer, the then Archbishop of Canterbury.

It wasn't always so, though! After Henry VIII's break with Rome, the introduction of the first BCP was met with widespread hostility in the South West, and in Cornwall and Devon in particular. Much of Cornwall was still wholly Cornish-speaking and English was the language of the "enemy". A call to translate the BCP into Cornish was rejected. Few people understood Latin either, but Latin was the "language of God" and the introduction of English offended against their Catholic and Cornish sensibilities. This religious anger was made worse because people were suffering under the huge taxes that had to be paid to fund the English army fighting in Scotland. Nonetheless, under King Edward VI, it was decreed in the Act of Uniformity that from Whit Sunday 1549 the new orders of service were to be used in every parish in England.

Trouble started when a government agent called William Brody, sent to ensure that the new Prayer Book was followed, was set upon in Helston and murdered. Then, on Whit Monday the Reverend William Harper, the vicar at Sampford Courtney, Devon, tried to conduct a service from the new BCP. An angry mob rose up and a local gentleman who came to remonstrate was killed. The protest soon became an armed rebellion and a force of ordinary people from Cornwall and Devon besieged and captured the city of Exeter. An army was rushed to the West Country and after a series of skirmishes the rebels were defeated in August 1549, with 4,000 of them being massacred. Discontented priests were hung from their church spires as an example, while five leaders from Cornwall and Devon were taken to London and hanged, drawn

and quartered after which the use of the Cornish language went into rapid decline and near extinction.

Remarkably, less than 140 years later most Cornish had become staunchly Protestant! So protests broke out when in 1688 King James II, a Roman Catholic, issued a Declaration of Indulgence towards Catholics that he required to be read out in every English church. Seven bishops including Trelawny, a native of Pelynt and after whom our Benefice is named, refused to read it. They were charged with seditious libel and locked in the Tower of London. To popular acclaim they were later acquitted, with the event being later commemorated in 1826 by the Vicar of Morwenstow, the Reverend RS Hawker, in the "Song of the Western Men", now better known as "Trelawny" and adopted as the Cornish National Anthem.



News from Talland

Jubilee celebrations: St Tallan's Bellringers (Viv Tregellas, Etty Morton, James and Jules Uniacke, Emma Bersey and Peter Foster) celebrated the Queen's Platinum Jubilee on Sunday, 5 June by ringing the bells at Talland Church for half an hour between 19:52 and 20:22, joining thousands of other bellringers throughout the Commonwealth who were ringing their bells at the same time. From kind donations collected, a permanent commemoration of the Jubilee was commissioned in the form of a new wooden "spider" which is suspended from the bell chamber floor, the traditional way to hang bell ropes. Into the bell-shaped spider, hand-crafted in 600-year-old yew by Owen Entwistle, is carved "EllR Platinum Jubilee 1952-2022". Following the half-hour peal, the Rev'd Richard blessed the new spider and prayed that "the sound of the bells bring joy to all who hear them".

We then went into the church to enjoy festive food and drink and a sing song. Organist Adrian Bell began the proceedings with the National Anthem, then guest organist Eric Foster, visiting from Italy, played a number of patriotic songs including Rule Britannia, Heart of Oak, The White Cliffs of Dover, Cornwall My Home, and Trelawny, which were all sung with gusto.

Operation London Bridge: Regrettably, a little over thirteen weeks after the Jubilee celebrations, and in accordance with official protocol following the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, the Bellringers gathered at midday on Friday, 9 September to toll the bells for a full one hour. On Sunday they reconvened to commemorate the accession of the new King, Charles III with a twenty minute peal. On this occasion, Etty, James, Jules, Emma and Peter were joined by David Bersey to make a full complement of six

New Church Flags: The flagpole on top of Talland Church tower is proudly flying new flags kindly donated by bell ringer, Peter Foster. The Union Flag was flown over the Jubilee Holiday; it was also flown to

commemorate the death of Queen Elizabeth II and to proclaim King Charles Ill, and will be hoisted to celebrate future national events, while St Piran's Flag will be flown throughout the summer months. Both flags are made to Admiralty specifications, and provide a perfect finish to the church tower.

Talland Bellringers at the Polperro Festival: The bellringers of Talland had a successful stall at the Polperro Festival. Garden plants, soft toys, local honey, excellent cakes, handmade greetings cards and hand-crafted Talland ceramics were among the items on offer, along with a "ring and make a wish" bell, and over £200 was raised for the Bell Tower restoration fund.

Talland hosts the Truro Diocesan Guild of Ringers: St Tallan recently hosted an evening of bellringing, welcoming around thirty fellow members of the Truro Diocesan Guild of Ringers (Eastern District), with representatives from St Cleer, Calstock, St Dominic, Liskeard, Pillaton and St Neot, who enjoyed a tour of the tower (including the roof) followed by ringing of the bells. Food and drinks, provided by the hosts, were served inside the church. Many of the guest ringers have stood atop other church towers, but all agreed that the view from Tallan is the best of all!



It's been a joy and I look forward to what we may jointly deliver for Midnight Mass... by the way, this was an absolute first, being booked for Christmas Eve in June! That just tells you how short the supply of organ players is throughout our community at the moment.

So, I write to comment on Eric's information about the organ having had a trumpet and a Cornopean stop in the past. As I navigated my way through 'Zadok the Priest' on Sunday, 18 September, in honour of our new king, Charles III, I sorely missed those brassy tones. The Swell Oboe is not a great substitute, even when combined with the 'Mixture' stop. The other thing I needed many times was a blend of medium volume stops. You can achieve a soft low sound on Dulciana on the Great, which is your only choice really if using Oboe for the contrasting fanfares. But there is nothing for warming that sound up slightly, nothing in the middle. I am not saying I got everything right, perhaps there is more to learn. But I wonder what stops Eric would have chosen?

News from Nigeria

I recently received a photograph of Nenchin Tongpan who is blind and a student at the Boys Secondary School [BSS], Gindiri, Nigeria where I used to teach.



Like the handicapped students who were at the school when I was there, he would not be in the school without me and my friends sending money for his school fees. Nenchin has successfully completed the Junior Secondary section of the school (equivalent to years 7 – 9 in the UK) and has passed his Junior Secondary Certificate of Education. He has now embarked on the three year course leading up to Senior Secondary Certificate in Education. I wrote recently about Emmanuel Karami who I taught when I was there and who was the first blind Nigerian student to gain a BSc in Mathematics.

The first blind student to be admitted to BSS was the late Bitrus Gani who studied there in the 1950s. Bitrus was the first blind secondary student in what was then British West Africa! He successfully gained his West African Certificate in Education, studied physiotherapy in the UK and eventually became Professor of Physiotherapy at Ahmadu Bello University (the "Oxbridge" of Nigeria).

I plan to hold a Table Top Sale on Sunday, 6 November at 2.30pm in Polruan Village Hall for school fees for Nenchin and for the children of Internally Displaced Persons, who fled when their tribal homeland in Gwoza in Borno State (north eastern Nigeria) was taken over by Boko Haram. They, like Kathleen and Daniel Gula, fled to the Jos Plateau and are still there as Boko Haram are still in control of their tribal homelands. Although the youngsters' parents have been able to do some subsistence farming and some are employed in the block industry Daniel and Kathleen set up near their new home at Vom, school fees and school uniforms are hard to afford without the help we send via Daniel and Kathleen. 

The Churches of Trelawney Benefice mark the death of Her Majesty

In Lanteglos-by-Fowey Parish, St Saviour was open on the evening of Thursday, 8th for quiet prayer and reflection and then on Saturday, 10th in the late afternoon for a Thanksgiving Service led by myself and Angie and Norman Mallard, with a similar service in the early evening led by The Rev'd Richard at St John, Bodinnick. On Sunday morning at the Parish Church of St Wyllow, our service began with the bell tolling 96 times and was very much focussed on the passing of our Queen and the accession of our new King. On Sunday, 18th our Patronal Festival service at St Wyllow, led by the Rev'd John Hawkes, not only celebrated our Patron Saint, St Wyllow, but also our late Oueen and our new King. On Sunday evening St Saviour was again open and a good number of us observed the National One Minute Silence and sang the National Anthem by candlelight.

At St Nun, Pelynt, there was a Commemorative service on Sunday, 11th and on Thursday, Kevin Wakeham, the Chairman of Pelynt Parish Council, read the Proclamation of accession in church and this was filmed and posted on Facebook for those unable to attend.

At St Ildierna, Lansallos on Sunday, 11th The Rev'd John Hawkes led the service and John Feesey said the prayers, praying for both Queen Elizabeth II and King Charles III and the National Anthem was sung. Memories of Polruan Girls Choir and Girl Guides 1952; 70 Years Ago

That year two very important things happened in our village for the girls aged approximately 12 to 20 years of age.

First, the Polruan Girls Choir was formed with Conductor, the late Leonard Rundle and Pianists, the late Alice Stone and the late Helen Hender – three dedicated people who gave those girls such happy times. To sing was a pleasure, to practice no problem and we formed long lasting friendships, still going strong today — not that there are many of us still around!

We sang the length and breadth of our county — singing on a Sunday afternoon and evening in a town or village church or chapel and having tea at the vicarage, or with kind people in their homes. Very often the late Rupert Tomlin with his clear, tenor voice accompanied us — then during the week we performed variety concerts, singing some of the latest 'hit songs', accompanied by the late George Tabb on drums. The applause on those evenings would bring the house down.

Then there were trips to Acton, near London invited by their choir, with Conductor, the late Roger Brady. Lovely people — and having one or two of our own songs recorded at the BBC Broadcasting House, the most popular song 'The Happy Wanderer', often requested by children and adults on Uncle Mac's Radio Request programme on Saturday mornings.

There was also a trip to Stade, near Hamburg, Germany where their choir welcomed us with open arms. Both choirs were invited to Polruan, and our families and friends did them proud. The choir eventually had to finish in 1958 as some of the girls left the village to improve their careers, or to marry, some going away to Australia, America and Norway. Those years will never be forgotten.

Second, there was the Polruan Girl Guides with Guide Mistress Elizabeth Compton. Happy days camping under canvas at Lanhydrock and Cartuther Barton, near Liskeard and meeting other Girl Guides



and enjoying their company. Elizabeth left Polruan and the late Phyllis Hill kindly became our Guide Mistress with meetings at her home 'Wellside'. Phyllis' late husband, Bill Hill, took us through our Knots, Morse Code and Semaphore Tests. Very strict he was too! Both Guide Mistresses instilled in us discipline, to be considerate to our elders and to respect all creatures great and small — so

Liz and I were driving along the A30 on the way to Exeter Cathedral for the 7.30pm performance of The Sixteen, conducted by Harry Christophers, singing sacred music.

At 6.35pm Classic FM Radio was interrupted – the Queen had died. At that moment the heavy squall over the Moors at Okehampton was transformed into a stunning rainbow.

Two previous concerts by The Sixteen had various problems. The first coincided with our younger daughter's flight from Australia and her coach arriving at Exeter bus station and we had to leave at half time. The second was two days after the fire in the Royal Clarence Hotel on Cathedral Green and the concert was cancelled. We were relieved to see a queue at the door where 600 were seated in the Nave in hushed disorientation – our memory of the Coronation was a world away.

The concert was one in a tour of twenty five cathedrals over a period of eight months, entitled 'An Old Belief'. It was an unusual mixture of Medieval Carols, some in Latin, and the work of Herbert Howells (1892 – 1983) and Hubert Parry (1848 – 1918). The latter's 'Tour de Force' was ' Songs of Farewell'. This was a six part lament entitled:

My soul there is a country I know my soul hath power to know all things Never weather-beaten soul There is an old belief At the round earths imagined corners Lord let me know my soul.

The last is the longest twenty six lines and most poignant, the first and last two lines of which read:

Lord let me know mine end and the number of my days That I may be certified how long I have to live . . . O spare me a little, that I may recover my strength Before I go hence and be no more seen.

Herbert Howell's contribution was 'Take him (her) earth for cherishing' this ends . . .

To thy tender breast receive him Body of a man I bring thee Noble even in its ruin.

Parry's work being based on Psalm 39 and Howells on Prudentius (348 – 413). The Concert programme contained all the text of the songs. As the concert developed we realised the significance to the death of the Queen; Parry's work written in the bleakness of the First World War.

At a time when we struggle to understand the loss, in our own minds, let alone write it down, it was helpful and reassuring to gain comfort from writers who had already trod that path. The significance was heightened by the Residentiary Canon's introduction who said please do not applaud at the end and leave quietly.

On the way back in the car we were overwhelmed by the coincidence of the weather and end of life poetry sung in the Cathedral. The chances of this in a few hours after the death of the Queen must have been millions to one. There is an alternative – the guiding hand of God offering solace, when we were lost. In discussion with friends in different parts of the country, our experience was not unique.

News from Frogmore Farm

Just after Charles and Camilla married, Lansallos Church caught fire. I wrote to our new Duchess of Cornwall asking if she would like to buy a slate for the roof. I had a lovely letter back enclosing a cheque towards the funds. She asked me if I would give her a progress report in a year's time. I wrote again the following year and was very touched that she had sent another cheque. A bit later in the year she visited the church to see how the repairs were coming along. She didn't want any official greetings or publicity. Then she took a walk along the cliff path towards Polperro. Unfortunately the mist descended so she went up to Shelia Roberts' tea room for a cream tea. She is now our Oueen Consort and Kate is our new Duchess

After a lifetime on the farm nature can still surprise us. Simon and I were feeding the animals one morning when we noticed something moving in one of our fields. We drove in to have a look and were amazed at what we saw. A young fawn (a baby deer) was playing chase with a crow. It's mother had left it in the long grass while she went off to eat. The crow must have hopped up to it and frightened it, maybe pecked it as they do young lambs. The fawn was chasing it, leaping and jumping. The crow would hop away then wait to be chased again. The game went on for ages, it was lovely to watch.

We have been feeding the animals with grain and silage all through the long hot Summer. They had no grass to eat, the fields were so dry. We were very worried that a cigarette end or a portable barbecue would start a fire that would burn hedges and crops. One benefit of all the very hot weather though was the fact that we didn't have to dry any grain. No dusty, hot, dryer roaring day and night.

The combine sometimes worked very late in the evening and one night finished at 1.30am. Because the grain came into the grain store at the same temperature as the air outside we have had to use some big blowers to cool it down.

The rams were introduced to the ewes in August, they were fitted with their harnesses which hold coloured crayons. Yellow first. We can then tell which ewes have been mated. Then three weeks later the crayon is changed to red. The ewes with the red backs will be later lambing. It's a good job Sophie will be helping again next year as it looks like early February will be very busy.



Hank and Fergus, the two bulls, have been separated from their cows. Last year we left it a bit late and ended up with a teenage Mum. Luckily she managed to deliver her calf without any assistance. It was quite a small calf but it is very lively. If you get anywhere near her she puts her tail in the air and races away. Hank is living in a field with some steers and Fergus is with a quiet cow and her little calf.

Several hedgehogs have been seen on Frogmore lawns in the evenings. One decided that the lambing shed would make a cosy Winter home. Unfortunately the dogs found it, although they couldn't hurt it they kept barking at it. I carried it home in a bucket, and put it near a wildlife corner. About two minutes later it had disappeared. It will be safe here with no passing cars as long as a badger doesn't find it. There are plenty of slugs and snails for it to eat, I know that for a fact because of my nibbled cabbages in the vegetable plot!

Parish Council Report Parish Council Meetings

The Parish Council have now returned to face to face meetings. Members of the public are warmly invited to attend.

Levelling up and Regeneration Bill

Cllrs Ainley and Rooney had attended Cornwall Council's presentation on 30 June. Cllr Ainley said that in order to get Level 3 funding, Cornwall had to elect a Mayor. Cllr Rooney said that the conversation needed to be held with elected Cornwall Councillors as it is they who make the decisions. He felt strongly that there should be a referendum on the question of an elected Mayor. Cllr Clare-Dunbavand said that at the very least Parish / Town Council should have their say. The Clerk was instructed to put this last proposal to CC and to query the difference in funding between Level 2 and Level 3. Cllr Pyke likened this to the Police Commissioners.

Polruan Surgery

A meeting has been held between representatives from the Fowey River Practise and Cllrs Adams and Goddard regarding appointments and dispensing services (see page 23).

Betty Hewans Footpath

Members have resolved to fund a freestanding handrail to assist users of the path. We are in the process of obtaining a price from the Countryside Accident Team, Cornwall Council.

Planning Applications

PA22/06066, Langdon Townsend – new balcony addition to eastern elevation, replacement sun room to western elevation, solar panels to southern roof plane, partial removal of workshop for new courtyard, new 1.8m high wall to southern boundary with new parking and garden. Members made no comment.

PA22/06525, Overferry Old Road Bodinnick – the complete demolition of the existing house and the construction of a new 4-bedroom replacement dwelling and detached garage with associated landscaping works with Variation of Condition 2 of decision PA22/02753 dated 24/05/2022. Members made no comment.

PA22/05284, 10 Hockens Lane Polruan – alteration of vehicle parking, construction of retaining walls, and re-levelling of the site to create garden amenity. Additional diagrams / views provided by the architect.

Members objected as the application appears to be inaccurate and it would impact on the enjoyment of the occupiers of No.12 due to loss of privacy and visual amenity (vehicles would be very close their bedroom accommodation; the plans could increase water runoff and add to the existing drainage issues in Polruan. If permission is granted then Members requested the number of parking spaces is limited to three, which is adequate for the size of the property. If the application is resubmitted, Members request a "proper" Design and Access statement.

Planning Applications Approved by Cornwall Council

PA22/03366, 4 Battery Park Polruan – redesigned roof to property. Reconfigure internal layout. Form first floor bedroom over existing balcony. Enclose garage side covered walkway within garage. Construct Veranda.

PA22/03552, 42 West Street Polruan – construction of an area of decking and glass balustrade on the flat roof of the existing timber garden building. It was confirmed this was a retrospective application.



Sustainable Warmth Fund

What this means for you and your home



The Sustainable Warmth Fund is the new grant- funded energy efficiency scheme from the Government. This fund aims to improve the Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) rating of your home with a range of energy saving measures. These measures will help with your heating costs, ensuring your home is warmer and improving your general health and wellbeing - essential in the current rising cost of living and energy crisis.

Cornwall Council are working in partnership with OVO Energy Solutions to deliver this scheme across Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly. This scheme runs until March 2023 and aims to help around 400 homes – could your home be one of those?

Am I eligible?

You or someone living in your home must have a health condition, or be at risk of poor health, or be caring for a vulnerable person, or be children aged 19 or under, or be worried about their home being cold or damp.

The total household income must be a maximum of £30,000 gross

(this means including tax and any other deductions).

Meeting between Fowey River Practice and Lanteglos by Fowey Parish Council

from Cllr. Goddard

Cllrs Adams and Goddard met with Drs Waldron, Marrett, and Knoblech at Fowey River Practie on 31 August 2022 to discuss medical services at Polruan surgery and the dispensing of prescriptions.

The meeting was held after a series of communications with NHS England following the withdrawal of dispensing to new Polruan patients after 2016 and NHS England's interpretation of the 2013 NHS Regulations.

Councillor Adams outlined the objective of the Parish Council and its residents' wish to keep the dispensing arrangements from Polruan surgery, particularly as postal services have been seen to be unreliable and are inappropriate for acute needs for prescriptions.

Doctor Waldron confirmed that the best solution for the Practice was to dispense to all patients, but the Practice must work to the NHS Regulations and ensure the financial viability of the Practice.

The NHS Regulations

The NHS Regulations for dispensing from Doctors' surgeries do not allow patients to have medicines dispensed from a GP Surgery where the patient lives within one mile (1.6 km) of a pharmacy as the crow flies (Boots in Fowey in our case) — affecting Polruan and Bodinnick. Patients living further than one mile can have prescriptions dispensed from a GP Surgery.

However, there are provisions in the Regulations for patients with 'special difficulties' to have prescriptions dispensed from Polruan surgery and the NHS Regulations also provide for 'historic rights' (dispensing arrangements agreed under previous versions of the Regulations) to be carried on.

Background to dispensing from Polruan surgery

Doctor Waldron outlined the original application to the relevant health bodies to dispense from Polruan surgery to all patients (regardless of distance from a pharmacy) based on geography — the river being a physical boundary. This was agreed by the regulating body at the time.

From the 1970s until around 2016 dispensing to patients within 1 mile continued, each patient requiring an individual application to dispense. Fowey River Practice invited all patients to apply for the dispensation and the Practice administered the applications which were all approved by NHS England.

From 2016 new patients' applications were rejected by NHS England. Fowey River Practice met NHS England to discuss dispensing and the 'one mile rule', but NHS England firmly refused to grant further applications

Doctor Waldron also outlined that GP Practices nationally had difficulties with the

'one mile' rule where there were geographic challenges such as estuaries.

The meeting discussed the Parish Council's view that the historic dispensing agreement established a precedent or 'historic right' that the current Regulations and its predecessors allowed to be carried forward.

Councillor Adams outlined correspondence that the Parish Council had already had with Lord Berkley and the Minister of Health.

The Parish Council will draft a letter to NHS England based on the exception being a historic right and circulate to Fowey River Practice for comment.

Challenges faced by GP Practices

GP Practices are independent but have contracts for the provision of services to the NHS (GP Practices therefore operate as a business which must have sufficient income to meet the costs of providing the services).

Challenges currently being faced are the shortage of new GPs entering practice; the age profile of current GPs which means many will be retiring shortly; the continuing need for qualified GPs to support first line medical staff such as nurse practitioners, physiotherapists, paramedics; and the continuing impacts of COVID on patients and staff.

There has been a 30% increase in requests for consultations compared to 2019 (pre-COVID) increasing from 35-40 consultations per day for each GP to 50-60 now.

Provision of general medical services at Polruan

COVID required changes to managing patient services and lessons learnt during the pandemic have been carried forward as better ways of managing patient services.

Screening of patients' needs by GPs (involving more information being requested when a patient contacts the surgery) has meant patients in acute need of medical interventions can be fast tracked and seen rapidly. This also means patients can be directed to other medical professionals when a GP appointment is not necessary.

Pre-booked appointments can also now be provided for two days ahead, one week ahead or two weeks ahead windows which are refreshed each day, so patients now have the chance to book as well.

There are some teething problems with this process however but this is being worked upon to improve patients' experience.

Polruan has 50% of its appointments now prebookable.

Fowey River Practice plan to re-establish or refresh the Patient Group which has not met face to face since the outbreak of COVID (there have been Zoom meetings). This should enable faster feedback of Patients' needs and concerns and access to surgery information going forward.

The 'U-Turn Round' at Golant

from Golant Heritage Group

Golant Heritage Group (GHG) has been fortunate to amass a rich collection of aural history recordings about the village. While these are available on the GHG website it was felt that offering a more accessible opportunity in the centre of the village would enhance the knowledge of locals and visitors alike. Thanks to the generosity of local organisations, including Fowey Harbour Heritage Society, the *U-Turn Round*, which was installed on the corner of the village green in August, offers a solution.

What is the *U-Turn Round*? The clue is in the name —it is a wind-up dynamo powered digital sound store. It offers eight category options which can be selected on the "Batwing" shaped dial and then by turning the handle the message can be played. In Golant we have chosen the following categories to represent the key heritage features of the village — Introducing Golant, Houses and Farms, Railway, People, Village Events, Agriculture and Apples, Buildings and The River. These are etched into the shaped insert on the front panel. Each snippet is about two minutes long and the content can be changed at any time using the USB programmer.

The joy of the *U-Turn Round* is that it does not require mains power and is made of tough stainless steel for high weather resistance. Usage statistics are standard and in the first month since installation on 6 August 2022 the recordings have been accessed 509 times. The *U-Turn Round* also features the Heritage Group QR code so that interested users can

easily access our website for more information about the village.

You can find the *U-Turn Round* just near the village map in the centre of the village by the human sundial and the newly installed village interpretation board. Please come and play with it and meanwhile many thanks again to Fowey Harbour Heritage Society for helping to make it possible.

Higher Windmill Allotments

Gardening in Polruan has been strange this year, but then every year is different. We have had the hottest summer for many years and our free draining soil has demanded frequent watering and this has been a daily task through the last couple of months. The hot weather has now broken and we have had rain, but temperatures are still quite high.

Most vegetables have done well — onions, salads, potatoes, beetroot, beans and spinach. Notably successful in the hot weather have been courgettes and marrows and a great crop of tomatoes was spotted on one allotment.

Fruit crops have done well — strawberries, raspberries, blackcurrants, gooseberries and apples. Rhubarb has been prolific when watered. Some of our allotment gardeners have had impressive shows of flowers through the season — they looked great!

Two competitions were run among allotment holders this year for the largest marrow and the tallest sunflower. One of Des's sunflowers was particularly admired by a bee — see his photo! Shortly we will start preparing the ground for the next season — some of us will be sowing onions and early broad beans ahead of the winter. 

The Princess Royal is the National Patron of the NCI. We were saddened to hear of the death of her mother, Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II. The Union Flag has been flying at the lookout at half mast throughout the period of national mourning, except during the Accession.

Polruan station is one of about 60 lookouts maintained and manned by volunteers around the coast of England and Wales. We liaise closely with HM Coastguard and maintain a daily visual watch looking out for maritime incidents as well as keeping an eye on coastal walkers. We monitor all marine radio channels and aim to man three watches each day through the summer. In winter this is reduced to two watches.

We are drawing to the end of a busy summer season with many visiting boats logged as well as there being a number of incidents.

During July there was a national Coastwatch day when we opened the station to visiting public to show them what we do and how we do it. It was a great success and we had numerous visitors to our newly refitted station. During August we had a well attended public barbecue held jointly with the Village Hall committee on the Coal Wharf.

We are always looking for new members. A thorough training is provided and watchkeepers do not need to have a maritime background. If you are interested in joining us, come to the lookout and talk to the duty watchkeeper who will be pleased to introduce you to what we do.

I'm sure we all recall the fine, albeit dry, weather we enjoyed over the summer, with the natural consequence of increased activity on the water. Unfortunately, this resulted in an increase in the number of 'shouts' requiring response from our local volunteer crews. Here is a selection:

On 9 July, the inshore lifeboat Olive 2 responded to a shout to a 75 year old man with a suspected acute infection while on a motor yacht in Pont Creek. Casualty care crew members, Kai A'Lee and Amelia Luck, assessed the casualty and confirmed the need for an ambulance. The Coastguard confirmed the request for an ambulance but informed the crew that there would be a long wait. It was decided to call a taxi instead, so the crew ferried the casualty and his partner to the lifeboat station to wait. Unfortunately, no taxi was available, so faced with a very significant delay, the lifeboat station Deputy Launch Authority, Richard Jeffery, took them by car to hospital.

16 July proved a busy day. At 6am the All-weather lifeboat, Maurice and Joyce Hardy, went to the rescue of a 35ft motorboat moored at Pont Pill, that was taking on water. Together with the Fowey Harbour Commissioner's deputy Harbourmaster, Jonathan Pritchard, (also cox at Fowey Lifeboat Station), who had already arrived at the scene, they took off two adults and one child and moved them onto the pontoon. The boat was by now listing: water entering through the stern gasket had flooded the boat's electrics and the boat was in danger of sinking. Using the pump from the All-weather Lifeboat, the crew pumped out the sinking boat. Assisted by the harbour commissioner's staff, they then towed it to Tom's Boatyard, where it was craned out of the water. In addition to the severe damage that sinking would have caused to the boat, a major environmental issue was avoided.

In the second shout of the day, at noon, the Coastguard requested assistance after receiving a Mayday call (a distress call where the vessel or its crew are in imminent and serious danger of loss of life or vessel) from a lone yachtsman on a 27ft yacht that had suffered engine failure near the entrance to Fowey Harbour. The vessel had been blown onto the lee shore rocks near Coombe Haven on a falling tide and was being pounded by waves. Fowey crew launched both lifeboats, sending the inshore lifeboat ahead to assess the situation. Crew member James Dowrick was landed ashore and crossed the rocks to board the vessel, to find the yachtsman

unharmed. A kedge was laid from the casualty vessel to prevent it from being driven further ashore once the tide had turned. Given the position of the vessel and the falling tide, it was decided that it would be unwise to use the larger lifeboat to attempt to tow the vessel off the rocks at that time. Instead, the yachtsman was evacuated to Fowey, while later in the afternoon a commercial company re-floated the vessel and towed it back to the lifeboat pontoon.

On 28 July, the volunteer crew launched the inshore lifeboat to rescue a 14 year old boy who was unable to swim and was stranded on Polmear Island. The lifeboat crew lifted the boy onto the lifeboat and took him back to Charlestown Harbour, where he was reunited with his parents.

On 30 July, the All-weather Lifeboat was launched to assist a 25ft motorboat that had broken down four nautical miles south of Polperro. On board were four people and a dog. On arrival, the crew established that the boat's engine was running but had lost drive. Cox, Lewis Bingley, set up a tow and the lifeboat towed the vessel back to the safety of Fowey Harbour.

On the evening of 6 August, the All-weather Lifeboat was launched to assist an 18ft sailing boat with two adults, two young children and a dog on board, with an estimated position one mile south of Dodman Point. However, the emergency call had been interrupted before the call was completed and the Coastguard were concerned as to their position. On arrival in the vicinity, the crew launched three parachute flares to illuminate the area so they could try and locate the vessel, allowing the woman on board the stricken boat to give directions to the lifeboat crew. The crew found the boat drifting with a small outboard engine that had failed. The family with a six-year-old, an eight-year-old and their dog were originally on their way to Penzance. The boat was towed the 10 nautical miles back to Fowey, where and the family were taken to the lifeboat station and given refreshments while awaiting transport.

On 7 August, the crews were on their usual Sunday morning training exercises when a Pan Pan call (an urgent but not lifethreatening call for assistance) was received. Both lifeboats headed towards the reported location, three miles off Gribben Head, with the inshore lifeboat reaching the casualty vessel first. A six metre semi-rigid inflatable had experienced an engine fault. The Allweather Lifeboat crew set up a tow and the boat was towed back to Fowey Harbour.

On the evening of the next day, a request was received to assist a man on a visiting yacht in Fowey Harbour who had accidentally splashed his face and eyes with acid. It was decided that a harbour patrol boat would be the fastest way to get the casualty care crew to the man on the yacht. Three crew members, Malcolm Richardson, Jimmy Hoddinot and Kai A'lee, in full RNLI protective gear,



were taken to the man's yacht where they administered first aid. Once stabilised, he was transferred to the lifeboat station where treatment continued. Two of the casualty's family had arrived at the station and in view of the delay in an ambulance arriving, they took him to hospital by car.

On 11 August, volunteer lifeboat crew rescued two adults and three children cut off by a rising tide at Lantic Bay. When the crew arrived, they found the group on a small patch of sand to the west of the main beach. As the swell was breaking onto the shore the helm, Kai A'Lee, decided to anchor and reverse towards the beach. Assisted by crew Luke Watts and Ross Jezard, one adult and two children were helped onboard the lifeboat and then landed onto the main beach. A second trip then rescued the remaining adult and child and returned them to the main beach.

On 12 August, the All-weather Lifeboat was launched to assist a 28ft yacht which had broken down 1.5 miles south of Polperro, with three people on board. In slight sea conditions and with little wind the yacht was quickly located. Lifeboat cox, Jonathan Pritchard, decided that the safest option was to tow the casualty vessel back to Fowey. The tow line was established and the three people and their yacht were towed safely into Fowey Harbour

There were three shouts for the busy volunteer crews during Fowey Royal Regatta. The inshore lifeboat was launched to assist in a medical situation on a pontoon at Pont, where a person on board a motorboat had called for help. Two casualty care trained crew used a waiting harbour patrol boat to assist the casualty, who was returned to the lifeboat station, where the family arranged transport to Penrice Hospital.

The next day, the All-weather Lifeboat was launched to assist a broken down 25ft yacht becalmed off Cannis. The boat, with two people onboard, was quickly located, towed into Fowey and handed over to Fowey harbour patrol.

On 19 August, our crew launched the inshore lifeboat to help a male kayaker stranded on rocks near Par Beach. On arrival at the scene, the lifeboat crew found that the man had self-recovered from the rocks. They checked he was safe and well, then handed him over to St Austell Coastguard rescue team.

To round off a busy period, on the bank holiday Monday, the All-weather Lifeboat was launched to assist a 44ft yacht whose engine had failed, 10 miles south east of Fowey. The yacht also had a damaged mainsail and was making slow progress, with four exhausted crew members who were attempting to reach home in Essex. Due to the sea conditions, the cox decided not to put any lifeboat crew onboard the yacht. Instead, a tow line was passed across and the yacht was towed into Fowey Harbour.

The RNLI is the charity that saves lives at sea.

We have now moved into the digital age. On Station everything is now recorded on our new iPad, all training, call outs, care and maintenance and everything else has its own little box to fill in with multiple sub boxes enabling every little detail to be recorded — as long as the right box to fill and button to press can be found! This I have yet to totally master and rely on younger members of the team who are more digitally minded — dinosaur is now a comment often pointed in my direction.

Thanks to those who responded to our recent recruitment drive — it was good to see the interest there for a challenging but rewarding job. Unfortunately due to the timing of the recruitment we were unable to advertise in the magazine but if you're interested in joining, please let the team know and we will keep you in mind for the next recruitment drive

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
